

FLY TYING SEMINAR WITH CHARLIE CRAVEN

Date: March 5th & 6th, 2016

Location: The Elkhart Conservation Club

Cost: \$100.00 per tier

The seminar will be limited to 30 tiers total and will be broken down into two one day classes (15 tiers on Saturday, March 5th, 2016 and 15 tiers on Sunday, March 6th, 2016). Both classes will cover the same content so there is no need to attend both days unless that is what you want to do. The cost for the seminar is \$100.00 per tier (\$200.00 if you for some reason you want to attend both Saturday and Sunday classes). And will include materials needed for the class, lunch, and beverages. Each tier attending the class will need to bring their own tying equipment (vise, tools, lamp, thread, etc.).

Please note that this is not a beginner level seminar and each tier will need to know basic fly tying techniques prior to the class.

I have tied flies since I was eight years old. I began tying commercially for local shops at the age of twelve and to this day I still can't get through a day without tying at least a few flies. Fly tying is a consuming endeavor to me, and I enjoy every minute of it.

Growing up in Colorado, I have had the chance to work and fish with some of the most innovative tiers and fisherman in the world. Guys like John Barr, Ross Bartholomay, Dennis Collier and a host of others have influenced my tying and designs. While I owe a lot of my success to people like these I have also learned that I am always my own worst critic and find that I'm forever looking for a better way of doing things. So many "new" patterns these days are beautiful to look at but haven't been water tested. A truly great pattern has to catch fish, be reasonably durable, and solve a problem. That is, achieve through the tying design or process, a result that was previously unavailable.

The seminar will cover patterns and techniques that Charlie has developed thru many years of commercial tying and guiding.

About the Recipient



The goal of Casting for Recovery - Michigan is to create memorable fly fishing experiences that unlock the healing power of the water and foster lasting relationships.

If you are interested, pick just one pattern to tie, buy a box of 100 hooks, the materials and get tying! To get you

there, Chef Terry Wittorp will have a spectacular lunch for all the tyers - which is worth at least 200 flies, but we will give you a break. Everyone is welcome, but please let us know so we can plan for lunch.

We will have a guest tyer every other hour show off his or her special pattern. The Tie-a-thon will last from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm.

If you are not a fast tyer and can't complete your 100 flies in that time, this is a good time to get a jump on your flies. We would certainly take more than 100 from anyone if they are ambitious and want to tie flies in advance. You don't have to be an expert tyer to donate flies.

MY KNOTWARE

A lot of large trout live in big rivers and I've read the articles on fishing rivers that tell you to break the river down into a set of smaller targets. To think of the river as a series of streams. To not try to fish the river all at once. The articles have great illustrations that show large boulders here, tree stumps there and shallow runs and deep pools. Which is great if the water is clear or you happen to have Superman's vision, which I don't. My usual method of discovering deep pools is to step into them. My crooked toes are testament to my method of locating underwater boulders.

Some authors suggest using a wading staff to decrease the risk of falling and to probe the river bottom. Unfortunately, that means you walk to the edge of deep pools or clank your staff on boulders. Neither is conducive to a stealthy

approach on wary trout.

Fortunately, the scientists at Lothary Labs have developed the new, must have item for all who fish, the Lothary Underwater Drone! Unlike ordinary drones that buzz around in the air and help you spy on the divorcee in the next block, the Lothary Underwater Drone (LUD) swims just under the surface of the water at your command.
