SJRVFF WELCOMES NICOLE WATSON

Nicole began fly fishing at 9 or 10 years old. She is a passionate fly fisher and conservationist.

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Currently, she is completing her research studying steelhead at Central Michigan University as a graduate student. Her research takes her to 46 tributaries surrounding Lake Michigan, twice per year. Her sampling sites include tributaries of the St. Joe, Kalamazoo, Manistee, Pere Marquette, and many others in both peninsulas of Michigan and in Wisconsin. She focuses on juvenile steelhead and uses the unique chemical signature of their ear bone

(otolith) to determine their nursery habitat. This signature is influenced by the water in which the fish lives. Streams with a unique water chemistry will result in a unique chemical signature of the fish's otolith. Analysis of the otolith signature can give insight to the life history of the fish and contributions of wild fish to the overall population; benefitting conservation and management.

Nicole is a member of Trout Unlimited, American Fisheries Society, and Anglers of the Au Sable.

IMAGES

I was fishing with a friend on a stretch of river we hadn't fished in several years. It was kind of like visiting an old friend, seeing how much remained the same and how it had changed over time. My friend remarked about a particular spot in the river and how he had nearly caught a nice brown trout there, his exact phrase was "I remember it like it was yesterday." Funny how we struggle to remember birthdays, anniversaries, and tax filing deadlines that come around annually but that hole, that bend in the stream, that willow tree next to the riffle is indelibly etched in our minds even if we haven't seen them in years.





One of the advantages of fly fishing is you get out there and see some beautiful places whether it's the Grand Tetons or just a pretty bend in a local stream, the sunlight filtering down thru the trees lighting up the shimmering rocks in the stream bed. You also see, hopefully, some beautiful fish, be it a silvery tarpon or the red speckled brookie. We get to see some interesting creatures from the tiny insects we study so carefully to all manner of beasts attracted to the water. Unlike other sports we are able to be relatively silent as we work up a stream (except when I trip over a rock or log) and catch sight of creatures that most people only see on TV. City folks pay good money to zoos and parks to see the beavers, otters, deer, elk, moose, eagles, turkeys, bears and other critters that

we see in their natural habitat. Of course they don't have to worry about being the next dinner entre of a brown bear.

Too often our photo galleries consist of grip and grin pictures most of which our children will inherit and delete or pitch. Without the context of the beauty of the stream, the excitement of the strike, that pulsation of that second rush of the trout towards cover, the wag of the tail as the revived trout heads back to its hole and the smile of our buddy watching all of this, those pictures lack meaning. Those of us who criticize a generation's fascination with endless "selfies" should look at our own photos and consider what historic record we are leaving behind. We could do a better job of capturing the beauty of fly fishing and what it means to us.
