




SJRVFF WELCOMES ONE AND ALL

MATCH WHAT HATCH?


With all due respect to the entomologists, biologists and expert fly tying aficionados in the crowd I have given up on trying to match the hatch. For our newer members the concept of matching the hatch is supposedly an attempt to select the one true fly that most closely matches the size, coloration and physical characteristics of whatever bug the trout in front of you is dining on at that moment. The concept of matching the hatch (MTH) has sold more books, magazines, fly shop flies and seminars than the total number of trout caught in the past 50 years.

Like every great concept MTH has been taken to ridiculous extremes. If one follows the MTH philosophy to its extreme and given the number of possible hatches, sizes of bugs, regional coloration differences, etc. you would need to enlist a Sherpa to tote the boxes of flies needed to cover all the possibilities. My vest already weighs 183 pounds what with all the gear and latest gismos packed in it. Adding 8,382 different flies and duplicates thereof in case, god forbid, I might put the ideal fly in a tree sounds like an invitation to a heart attack.

Then there is the problem of eyesight, both mine and the trout's. Unless the hatch consists of bugs the size of grasshoppers my limited eyesight precludes me from correctly identifying the differences between ichcodicowhatever and whatitsflies, if I had any clue what the differences were. I find reading entomology books about as exciting as reading the tax code. I have tried to get my wife to read entomology books to save on buying sleeping pills.

MTH assumes that trout have the time, interest and vision to correctly differentiate between bug A and bug B or bug A and a fly that looks somewhat similar to bug A. Time has to do with the speed of the

current and fear of predators. The faster the current or greater chance of flying predators the less time the trout will invest in inspecting your fly. Throw in water coloration, glare, bubbles and other debris in the current and it is amazing that fish can feed at all. Interest assumes that the trout cares about the taste or texture of what it is considering dining on. Perhaps in their ideal pool trout have the time to be fussy. But just as you aren't that particular what goes in your bag at the drivethrough window, I doubt that most trout are terribly picky when consuming their meal in the riffles. Finally, MTH assumes that trout have eagle like vision and can detect the tiniest deviations. If that were true I would be still waiting to catch my first trout.

ELEVENTH ANNUAL TIE-A-THON APRIL 22ND

On **April 22nd** fly tyers from various Federation of Fly Fishers and Trout Unlimited Clubs from around the Great Lakes region will come together for the 11th annual Tie-athon to tie and donate flies benefitting three Trout Unlimited Youth Camps. The camps include Illinois Council of Trout Unlimited Youth and Fly Fishing Camp, Kalamazoo Valley Chapter of Trout Unlimited Youth Camp and the Trout Unlimited National Teen Summit which will be held in Michigan. The event is being held at the Elkhart, Ind. Conservation Club, which has donated their use of their facility again.



About the Recipients

The Illinois Council of Trout Unlimited - The annual Conservation and Fly Fishing Camp is held on the banks of the famous Au Sable River in Michigan from July 23 to July 28. Campers learn more about conservation and fly fishing in a week at camp than most of us learn in a lifetime. The camp accepts young men and women ages 13 through 18. Instruction is provided by Trout Unlimited volunteers, faculty from Midwestern Universities, and local professionals.

The Kalamazoo Valley Chapter Trout Unlimited is hosting the Michigan Youth Trout Camp Tuesday June 25-June 29th at the Ralph A. MacMullan Conference Center on Higgins Lake, in the heart of Northern Michigan trout country. The four-day Camp is designed to educate our 12-16 year old boys and girls about the importance of protecting our cold-water resources. Students will discover what trout need to survive, where they hide, and, with help from some of Michigan's leading conservationists and anglers, how to catch them. 
