




SJRVFF WELCOMES DON LYONS

Don was born and raised in Dowagiac, Michigan. He was interested in fishing at an early age and, like many kids, enthusiasm was easier to come by than money. However, growing up in the same neighborhood as the Heddon factory meant that from them all sorts of discarded baits and hardware could be scavenged, and baits good enough to catch fish could be made. A summer lawn mowing route saw Homer Circle, who at the time was Heddon's Vice President and Director of Advertising, became Don's most valued customer because he paid in fishing tackle rather than cash. And yes, Don still has the personally inscribed fly rod he received from Mr. Circle. Always mindful of the quality that Heddon products represented, he also still has the Mark IV spinning rod and Mitchell 300 reel he purchased with the cash made from that lawn mowing route.

By 1991 Don's business founded in Dowagiac in 1970, Lyons Industries,

needed to expand. The old Heddon factory had been vacant since 1984 and represented an opportunity to acquire and save a local landmark as well as provide room for their business to expand.

In 1994 a family friend, who was a retired museum curator, suggested that they should set aside a portion of the old Heddon factory and acquire the items that Heddon's former general manager, Trig Lund, had saved. If they could do that, he offered to donate his time to help them set up and run a museum. When the new museum was opened in May of 1996, it was a relatively modest presentation of the Heddon artifacts that had been saved by Mr. Lund and also those baits that were in Don and Joan's own tackle boxes. In their own minds, they were simply trying to save some local history. What they were completely unprepared for was the worldwide collector interest in all things Heddon. The museum has since expanded fivefold and in the process



assembled the largest collection of Heddon artifacts in existence. They have both written books which are expected to be released in the next 6-12 months. They've also recently undertaken a complete reorganization of the museum in order to better tell the Heddon story through the artifacts.

The museum is entirely self-funded and no admission is charged.




Next time you are lucky enough to get one of these amazing fish to the net, I would challenge all of you to take a moment and just think. Really look at the fish you

It may not be as silvery or pretty as it was just a week earlier while swimming in Lake Michigan but just look into its eyes, look at the markings on the tail and atapose fin, think about its battle scars, its now dog like teeth that have just developed during this final week of its life and just think of the distance and obstacles it had to overcome just to get to the spot the two of you are sharing at that time.

Then while you are driving home or day dreaming at the office the next day just think back to the fish. Just think that fish you just spent 10 minutes with will be dead in a few days if not already. Just think of it possibly being born at the very spot you just were holding that fish. Just think that your fish spent a year or more avoiding predators in the general area you just landed that fish. Just think just one day it's powerful instincts kicked in and that fish made the same journey from a few years ago but this

This is a rather informal gathering with no start time or end time – just lunch around noon. According to all reports, this is one heck of a salmon run so come enjoy the day!






DIRECTIONS TO THORNAPPLE LANDING

Take 131 north from Grand Rapids, MI. to M82 (about 30 mi). Take M82 west to Thornapple Ave. Go north on Thornapple Ave. to Thornapple landing. The group is usually in the Northwest part of lot closest to the river but you can look for the canopy and someone will be nearby.
