How I misspent my youth – the spin cast years!

I caught my first fish at the ripe old age of 12 months – my Grandfather was a fishing guide on Lake Hamilton near Hot Springs, Arkansas. He snatched me from the car when my parents arrived at the lake home for my first visit. He put a straw hat on my head (I still have it) and sat on his dock holding me with a cane pole, and we caught Bream! It was the first of many summer visits.

When I was older, we would fish every day for the three weeks we visited (unless it was raining). With Gramp, fishing was serious business, the day looked like this: up at 4AM, coffee, a couple of oatmeal cookies and walk to the dock. We were typically on the water by 4:30AM. Dad was usually along as well. We'd fish for Bass until about 11AM and head for the house and lunch. Any fish we caught would be

put in a live box at the dock to be dealt with later (not much catch and release at the Woodruff household back then).

After lunch we'd head out about 1:30PM for Bluebill or Crappie fishing and return for dinner, which was at 5:30PM. Gramp would usually clean the days catch before dinner. As a guide, he had cleaned thousands of fish; to watch him filet was like watching a Samurai! One slice, one filet, second slice, second filet. Toss the skeleton off the cleaning station into the lake the turtles were waiting. He would then remove the skin in one pass and while it was gently floating down to the water, the second filet would be separated from its skin. (We always had fish to take home!)

After dinner, we would leave the house again at 7PM for an evening of Bass fishing and return between 10 and 10:30PM. Going to sleep was easy! This ritual was repeated nearly every day for the duration of the visit.

The only variable was that some afternoons, I'd take the boat I was allowed to use over to the general store to buy fireworks, and then spend the afternoon blowing stuff up or seeing how high I could launch a 1LB coffee can (the record was two stories)! I did learn how to use lady fingers to filet Bluegill, but they proved to be inedible.

I'll continue this saga next month – Eric

The Mayfly Project's mission is to build relationships with children in foster care through fly fishing and introduce them to their local water ecosystems, with a hope that connecting them to a rewarding hobby will provide an opportunity for them to have fun, feel supported, and develop a meaningful connection with the outdoors. The Mayfly Project's standard program is to mentor a foster child through five sessions or"stages", just like the life cycle of a Mayfly. At the end of the five stages the child is given his or her very own fly rod, and equipment.
